JONATHAN GRAY: Thomas Baxter in London, Worcester and Wales



Jonathan Gray studied Economics at Swansea University, graduating in 1989. His passion for Swansea's ceramics started during his time in Wales when he was also working during holidays for Geoffrey Godden, who gave him great encouragement. He is a committee member of the English Ceramics Circle, an active member of several ceramic societies, and has published numerous books and papers on Welsh ceramics.

Jonathan's talk will give a great insight into Thomas Baxter's decorating studio in London, which relied heavily on Coalport blanks with Thomas Baxter Junior's subsequent work at Flight, Barr and Barr, Swansea and Chamberlain regarded as a high point of regency porcelain decoration in Britain. Jonathan will cover the output from each of these phases of decoration and consider the wider context for the change in style at the beginning of the nineteenth century that perhaps had contributed to the demise of the Caughley factory.



JOHN DEMOCRATIS: What do you have to do to establish a great potworks?

John Democratis has been a collector of English ceramics since the 1970s, specialising in early Spode china wares. He has been a trustee of the Spode Museum for the last ten years, six of them as He has published several articles on Spode, his researches including the early Spode china painters. He has given

lectures on Spode to collector societies and antique groups.

John will give an analysis of Spode's evolution from "just another" small Staffordshire pottery to its pre-eminence during the Regency period, including the challenges faced by the Spodes, their adoption of new technologies, and their assimilation of designs and techniques from Caughley.

MAURICE WRIGHT: A Caughley collector's diary – basics and some tips for the unwary



Maurice Wright was, until April of this year, President of The Caughley Society. Well known to members, he is very knowledgeable about the shapes and styles used by the Caughley factory, derived in part from accumulating a large collection of Caughley porcelain over many years. He was a major contributor to the pattern book "Caughley Blue & White Patterns".

Maurice Wright will relate his experiences over the years in building up a collection of mainly blue and white Caughley porcelain and in doing so learning the possible mistakes that are easily made in sorting out what is Caughley and what are the lookalikes.
